For adults using family violence



The program provides each client with up to 20 hours of support and can be provided face to face, by telephone or through outreach.

The Case Management Program for Adults using family violence focuses on:

- Supporting adults using family violence to take responsibility for and stop their use of violence
- Providing an individualised response by coordinating access to specialist services such as alcohol and other drugs (AOD), disability services, mental and physical health, parenting services, financial counselling, employment, social support and housing services.
- Assisting in engagement with programs that aim to stop family violence and address barriers to engaging in the change process

WHO CAN USE THIS PROGRAM?

Adults using family violence who:

- Are aged 18 years or over; inclusive of all sexualities & gender diverse communities
- Want to take responsibility for their actions and want support to end their use of violent and abusive behaviours.
- Have used family violence against their partner and/ or family or kinship member
- Identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander or have English as a secondary language, and require support to access culturally appropriate specialist services.

And at least one of the following:

- Have been removed from the home as a result of using violence against family members and require practical support around managing risk.
- Have been assessed as unsuitable for a Men's Behaviour Change Program due to:
 - English is not their primary language.
 - have complex needs that require intervention, support and stability before



- they can safely participate in programs that aim to stop family violence, including mental health, AOD and homelessness issues.
- have complex needs that require an individualised response, including cognitive impairment and acquired brain injury (ABI), and require support around complex health and social issues.
- may be at risk from other perpetrators due to the nature of their offending, relationship context.
- are otherwise ineligible for a Men's Behaviour Change Program.
- Are currently attending or have recently attended a Men's Behaviour Change Program
- Are currently completing or have completed Dads in Focus and require additional practical support.

ABOUT FAMILY LIFE:

Every family deserves to live in a safe and supportive community.

Everything we do supports this through our family and individual support services, community strengthening programs, a network of op shops, a vibrant engaged Volunteer community and passionate skilled staff.

With innovation at our core, we work towards a future of capable communities, strong families and thriving children.

Home in Focus is a free and voluntary program for families living in the Bayside Mornington Peninsula Area where Family Violence has occurred, and the family unit remains living together.

The program is delivered via a combination of office based and in family home sessions, running for 20 weeks.

HOME IN FOCUS AIMS TO WORK WITH THE WHOLE FAMILY TO: ...

- End family violence and harmful behaviours
- Explore the impact of past experiences on family relationships and parenting
- Understand the effects of family violence on all family members
- Elevate the voice of the child
- Foster attachment-focused parenting
- Break the cycle of family violence and intergenerational trauma
- Enhance personal wellbeing
- Develop strategies to create a safe, loving home where children can thrive.

Home in Focus adopts a holistic, person-centred, and strengths-based approach to create lasting, positive change for individuals, families and their communities.

HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?

Our program provides tailored therapeutic support to each family member, fostering lasting, positive change. We empower parents and prioritise children's voices and wellbeing.

Fathers work with their own practitioner, while mothers and children share a practitioner over 20 weeks. Our holistic, risk-assessed approach ensures safety, strong connections, and meaningful change.

Using evidence-based strategies, we address family violence, trauma, and parenting challenges to foster healthier interactions. Our program provides a non-judgmental space for men to reflect, take responsibility, and work towards positive change. By focusing on accountability and growth, we help rebuild trust, enhance emotional security, and create family relationships free from violence.

IS THE PROGRAM FOR ME?

Home in Focus can help if your family is:

- · Experiencing family violence
- Parenting in a way that doesn't match your values
- · Having difficulty in managing your mood
- Wanting to feel happier and more connected with your family
- Committed to creating a safe environment where your children can thrive, by fostering healthy, secure attachments.

WHAT WILL WE LEARN DURING HOME IN FOCUS?

Together we will learn:

- Emotional literacy, regulation, and conflict management
- Respectful communication, parenting, and co-parenting skills
- Empathy, perspective-taking, and attunement to children
- The impact of violence and trauma on families and pathways to healing
- Strengthening family bonds, rebuilding trust, and accessing support

Father's Individual Journey:

- Take responsibility for actions in a safe, nonjudgmental space
- Reduce harm, increase safety, and foster respect within the family
- Create a healing environment and strengthen father-child attachment
- Develop healthier behaviours and seek support when needed



What About Me?

An activity based group for primary school aged children of separated parents



Our Program

Aim

What About Me? has been developed to support primary school aged children who have experienced family separation and/or reside with only one of their parent's. The program aims to address the impact of separation and parental conflict and provides support to children in a safe environment.

This is achieved by

Psychoeducation delivered through art therapy, child-centred play therapy, and peer supported group therapy.

Facilitators

Group facilitators are specialised and experienced practitioners in the family and child welfare space. The group is child-focused and facilitators work within the best interests of the child and the child safe standards frameworks.

Session Topics

Unpacking Family

The aim of this session is to explore family dynamics and help children to better understand their family system.

It's Never the Child's Fault

This session aims to support children to understand parental separation.

Safe Relationships

This session aims to educate children and explore what is and isn't a safe and healthy relationship, helping children identify the trusted adults in their life.

Adult Worries

This session helps children to identify, unpack and explore which worries and responsibilities belong to adults.

What About Me?

An activity based group for primary school aged children of separated parents



Caught in the Middle (for children whose parents may be involved in Family Law matters)

This session will deliver a child-friendly explanation of Court processes that children may be exposed to.

Women's & Children's Family Violence Counselling

A holistic and integrated approach to working with women and children who have been impacted by family violence.

Referral criteria:

- There has been a recent or historical incident of family violence
- The person who has been impacted by family violence is a woman or child (under the age of 18 years)
- The women or child is in a space to benefit from therapeutic support

Family Violence Counselling:

Family violence counselling is a supportive and holistic approach over 6 sessions to working with women and children who have been affected by family violence. Our counselling service aims to provide the affected person with a safe space to gain awareness of the impact of violence on themselves and / or their child, and to help them develop more positive, healthy and safe relationships.

Family violence counselling is therapeutic in approach, utilising a variety of counselling models and approaches based on the unique experience of each individual.

Program objectives:

- To identify and maintain their safety through the development and implementation of a safety plan
- To assist the client to understand the impact of violence on themselves and / or their child
- To provide a safe environment for the client and create opportunities to work through their trauma
- To identify and build on their strengths and positive attributes
- To develop the client's self-care routines through a trauma- and client-centred approach
- Provide a tailored, individualized intervention, using internal and external supports to best meet the needs of the client

Case management and Counselling Support

Family Life is a specialist family services provider known for its innovation, impact and whole-of-community approach.

Family Life's Integrated Family Services and Women & Children's Family Violence Counselling Programs provide trauma-informed, wrap-around support to families where there is a young person in the home using violence. This counselling and case management support is designed to work with families who have previously experienced family violence from an adult.

The IFS Practitioner utilises an outreach case management model, working with parents/carers for a period of 3-6 months by providing psychoeducation and practical strategies to improve family functioning and increase emotion regulation within the family relationships. Simultaneously, the Counsellor provides therapeutic support across 15-20 sessions to the young person in a clinic based setting, to help them better understand and regulate factors that contribute to their use of violence in the home.

Eligibility Criteria

- Families with with a young person in the home aged between 12 and 17.5 years old
- Families where the young person is using violence in the home and has experienced family violence
- Families residing in the Bayside Peninsula region

- Families where the young person is willing to attend onsite clinic-based appointments in Sandringham or Frankston
- Families where the young person is in a space to benefit from clinic based therapeutic support and both the young person and parent is consenting to this

Referrals for Family Life's Young Person Violence in the Home support can only be received via the Bayside Peninsula Orange Door, via the usual IFS Allocations process.

*Please note, Family Life requires a consultation to occur between a Family Life Team Leader and the Orange Door for each referral, due to the limited number of spots available within the program.

Supporting fathers to create healthy relationships



DADS IN FOCUS

Dads in Focus is an intensive, wrap around service for fathers with a focus on developing healthy family relationships. The aim is to assist fathers to gain awareness of the impact of their parenting choices on their children and to help them develop more positive, child focused parenting skills.

Making serious, positive changes can have a lasting impact on the lives and experiences of children and families, and Dads in Focus offers participants a tailored, therapeutic approach to address their parenting choices.

OBJECTIVES

The aim of this tailored service is to assist fathers to:

- Develop and strengthen their parenting skills
- Appropriately negotiate safe and responsible parenting roles with the mother/other parent / carers of their children
- Identify, understand and recover from their own experiences of trauma
- Identify and build on their strengths and positive attributes while taking responsibility for their behaviours and action
- Understand the impact of violence and trauma on children
- · Provide an individualised intervention, using internal and external supports to best meet the needs of the father and facilitate behaviour change

OPTIONS

To best meet the individual needs of fathers and their family, Dads in Focus provides a suite of services which may including:

- Individual counselling
- Family Dispute Resolution (for a parenting plan)
- Children's Contact Service (for supervised /supported child contact)
- Parenting Orders Program (specialist post-separation support for parents and children)
- Men's Behaviour Change Program

DELIVERY METHOD

• Dads in Focus services are provided online or face to face at our Frankston Office

REFERRAL CRITERIA

- People referring to the service must be fathers
- The father must live in the Bayside, Dandenong, Frankston, Glen Eira, Kingston Mornington Peninsula, Port Phillip or Stonnington area.
- The father has or has had an IVO in place
- The father has a history of federal or family court, or child services involvement

Family Relationship Centre (FRC)

FRCs play an important role in improving family relationships by providing information, support and referral services to families around relationships and parenting. The Family Life FRC supports the diversity of family relationships and specialises in Family Dispute Resolution (FDR) and Property FDR.

FAMILY DISPUTE RESOLUTION (FDR)

FDR is a safe, child-focused form of mediation that allows separated parents or caregivers to create a Parenting Plan to best support their family system. It is voluntary and provides parents/caregivers the opportunity to create arrangements that will support the needs and interests of the children involved.

FDR Practitioners are impartial and assist parents/ caregivers to focus on what is in the best interests of their child/ren. All cases are assessed to see whether FDR is suitable for your situation.

This service aims to provide an alternative to formal legal processes for families who are separated. Parents are required to attend FDR to attempt to resolve the issues in dispute before taking a parenting matter to court.

You can only apply to a family law court for a Parenting Order when you have a Certificate s60I which states that you have made a genuine effort to resolve your dispute through FDR first (exceptions may apply).

In some FDR cases Child Inclusive Practice (CIP) is offered to families. This provides an opportunity for parents/caregivers to hear from the child/ren about their experience. This can assist parents/caregivers to create arrangements that support the best interests of the child/ren.

FDR is confidential unless there are safety risks. If you have concerns about your safety or the safety of your children, you should tell your FDR practitioner as soon as possible.

PROPERTY FDR

Property FDR assists separating families with dependent children under the age of 18 years, to sort out the division of family 'property', which may include bank accounts, houses, superannuation, and mortgages. This service aims to assist separated families to resolve their property issues.

To be eligible for this service, your net asset pool (excluding superannuation and after taking into account any mortgages, loans or other debts) must be no more than \$500 000. This service cannot assist with matters involving division of debt, trusts, or complex business interests.

FDR and Property FDR through Family Life is available to people who are separating or separated and live and/or work in the Frankston or Mornington Peninsula areas.

Fees may be payable on a sliding scale according to income.

Waiting periods may apply and vary according to demand.

Back on Track (BOT)

Supporting Children and Families Impacted by Family Violence

A no cost program open to any families who can travel to our purpose designed therapy centre in bayside/Kingston area (location given after referral for confidentiality and additional safety.

The program runs twice a year over two school terms.

There is a maximum of 10-12 families dependant on family size.

Program Overview

Back on Track (BOT) has been specifically developed to address the impact of family violence on children and the non-offending (safe) parent. The effects of family violence can present in various ways, including disruptions to the parent–child relationship, increased sibling conflict, emotional dysregulation across family members, and challenging behaviours—often directed towards the safe parent.

Safe parents may experience decreased parenting confidence, isolation due to their child's behaviour, and challenges such as school refusal.

At BOT, we recognise that **each family is unique**, and that **every family member is both an individual and an important part of the family system**. Our approach respects the strengths, experiences, and needs of each person.

The program has a focus on connection, validation and being curious about the family's needs in a down-to-earth way to reduce shame and disconnection.

All our therapists are committed to being neuro-affirming and trauma-informed.

Program Approach

Using evidence-based and trauma-informed frameworks, BOT supports both the

parent's and child's needs, helping families to understand and respond to the underlying causes of challenging behaviours.

The program integrates psychoeducation, play and art-based therapies, and principles of Dialectical Behaviour Therapy (DBT) within a family-focused model.

BOT includes:

- Children's groups tailored to age and developmental stage
- Parent-only groups providing education, skills, and connection
- Family and dyadic sessions that strengthen attachment, communication, and emotional regulation

Additional Optional Activities

- Jujitsu Classes: Families can opt into therapeutic Jujitsu sessions, co-facilitated by Panda, our highly experienced Jujitsu leader, alongside a qualified therapist.
 These sessions promote self-regulation, confidence, body awareness, and connection in a safe, supportive environment.
- Mini Messy BOTs Playgroup: Designed for preschool-aged family members, this
 play-based group offers creative, sensory-rich activities that encourage
 exploration, bonding, and emotional expression through messy play.

Program Structure

BOT is delivered by **trauma-informed child and family specialists** over two school terms, with a total of **18 weeks of structured engagement**.

- **Term 1:** Children participate in therapeutic group sessions (grouped by age and developmental needs), while parents engage in a parent-only support and education group.
- **Term 2:** Children continue their group sessions, and families begin **family-based and dyadic therapy sessions** focused on child lead play, fun, science, and connection.

Outcomes and Evidence

External research of the program demonstrates that early intervention programs like BOT contribute to:

- Improved emotional regulation and behaviour in children
- Strengthened parent-child relationships

- Reduced high-risk and aggressive behaviours in adolescence
- Increased school attendance and engagement
- Healthier future relationships
- Referrals into services that meet the families' specific needs post program.

Referrals

Exclusion criteria:

Providing therapeutic support in the safest and most helpful way means that if the family are still living with the person using violence (PUV) or they have custody visits, and it is not safe for the child to learn and discuss new things they cannot join the program.

If the safe parent (mum) is not group ready for themselves.

If substance use impacts the safe parents focus and ability to be present

The process:

Email the team: therapy@emergesupport.org.au

You will be sent a referral form to complete and send back.

You can email for a phone session to ask any questions

A team member will call the referrer for any additional information and ensure consent has been given from the potential new client.

If the program is the right fit for the family a team member will call them to discuss the group and answer any questions or concerns.

If the family would like to go ahead with the program, we organise a two -hour assessment for all family members.

The family have the choice after the assessment to enrol in the program and any additional opt in groups offered.

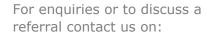
Eligibility

Emerge offers a range of therapeutic supports to women and children (0-17 years) who have experienced family violence. The safety and wellbeing of all clients is our main priority.

For us to provide a service, the eligibility criteria for clients are:

- Main reason for referral is recovery from the impacts of family violence.
- Not currently living with, planning to live with or having regular unsafe contact with person using violence.
- Current safety plan is in place and legal advice has been obtained if required.
- Currently linked in with a GP and/or other appropriate supports.
- For children referred, their mother/caregiver has access to support and is able to support their child to engage in the counselling process.

AIMS

Beyond The Violence facilitator training will assist participants, through experiential learning, to develop the specialised skills and insight to facilitate the Beyond the Violence group program. All participants will receive a copy of the Beyond the Violence manual.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

The three day training will assist participants to:

- Understand the impacts of Family Violence on women and children
- Explore strength-based, participant-driven group formats
- Identify techniques and strengths for group work, engagement and facilitation
- Increase skills and confidence in supporting families who have experienced violence
- Practice group work skills in a family violence context, within a parents', children's and combined family group

Participants will be provided with live supervision and debriefing.

Training will be delivered by Carey Cole from Anglicare Victoria. Carey has experience in parent and community education and working with women and children who have experienced family violence.

WHAT IS THE BEYOND THE VIOLENCE PROGRAM?

Beyond The Violence is an 8-week group for nonviolent parents and children who have experienced or are experiencing family violence.

The program helps families to establish safety, rebuild family relationships and move forward with their lives following family violence.

The emphasis of the group is on:

- Moving forward in a positive manner
- Rebuilding family relationships
- Building skills parenting skills and children's social skills
- Increasing safety and minimising risk

The program aims to allow a learning environment where participants are supported to:

- Acknowledge the past and its impacts
- Establish or re-establish appropriate parent-child roles, relationships, responsibilities and trust
- Explore alternative approaches and behaviours that respect the rights of the individual and of others
- Feel safe
- Develop self-esteem and positive communication skills
- Accept responsibility for one's own actions
- Set, and work toward, family goals
- Build hope and trust
- Develop the life families want beyond the violence

BTV IS RUN IN FRANKSTON, DANDENONG, ROSEBUD & GIPPSLAND*

Live supervision and regular debriefing will be available to all those who co-facilitate the eight-week BTV program. Completing the three-day BTV facilitator training is a prerequisite for facilitating the eight-week BTV program.

The LYFT program aims to reduce the harm of problematic AOD use and improve health and wellbeing outcomes for young people and their families.

The LYFT model does this by:

- Combining therapeutic treatment techniques to assist the young person and family engage in more helpful behaviours.
- Individual and family counselling.
- Providing information and education to young people and their families.
- Provides flexible support to young people.
- Case co-ordination
- Parent support groups every school term



The Linking Youth and Families
Together (LYFT) program assists
young people aged 12-25
and their families to address
difficulties associated with
Alcohol and Other Drug use.

While LYFT incorporates techniques from a youth development, Alcohol and other drugs, and family systems perspective, it is the way they come together in practice that leads to effective and measurable change for young people.

The LYFT Up Your Family parent/carers group is a 6 week group for any parents/carers of young people aged 12-25 who reside in the Mornington Peninsula, Frankston area who are looking to:

- Better understand their adolescents and their behaviours
- Understand adolescent brain development
- Learn more about alcohol and other drugs and their effects
- Learn positive communication skills to use with their adolescents
- Explore problem solving
- Connect with other parents/carers of adolescents



A typical LYFT intervention is approximately 12 sessions, or 3-4 months. This is flexible depending on the family's needs. LYFT is an outreach model and our clinicians meet the young person and their family in the community in in their home.
